Our new boiler is scheduled to arrive some time in July. The building will not be ready for it. We knew from the start, the steam tunnel from the boiler room to the planer mill was going to be an issue and would have to be relocated. This tunnel also carries all our communications lines from the boiler room to the planer mill and also from the boiler room to the sawmill. Lindsay Construction's surveyor has been on site this week. Survey equipment has changed dramatically over the years. This new survey equipment has plotted millions of points, yes millions, at the boiler, planer, and sawmill buildings. By the time you read this article, the survey should be complete, and we will be ready to break some ground. First, we will relocate and install new steam lines

The foundation for the addition to the boiler room will follow. At the same time, the foundation work for a new log brow at the sawmill. We require a new log line into the debarker completed before the building foundation can be completed as the new foundation will run through the existing log line. Most contracts for the first phase of the sawmill upgrades have been signed. Four of the companies we will be dealing with are Lindsay Construction (Halifax), Molnar Welding (Lantz), TS Manufacturing (Ontario) and McDonough Manufacturing (New Brunswick).

As mentioned earlier, Fritz Weirathmeuller is the engineer guiding us through a huge number of issues to make our project successful. Fritz has been on site this week and things are really starting to come together.

Every company needs a "Jack of All Trades". Besides his diverse skills, our "Jack of all Trades" earns extra Brownie Points for his positive attitude. When challenged with "other duties as assigned", he is always willing to give it his best. In the last days of this month, Mark and Craig challenged Darren Isenor with yet another "out of the ordinary" chore.

Now that we are expecting a substantial amount of equipment deliveries for our upcoming projects, we will require a safe and secure place to house them until they are ready for installation. Notes from Woodlands

We are well under way with the Mi'kmaq Forestry Initiative (MFI) commercial thinning and irregular shelterwood trial harvest taking place on the MFI St. Croix lands. It is exciting to have the opportunity to participate with the trial which will be studied by Department of Lands and Forestry going forward to determine treatment effects on the stand. The trial study should also help provide some clarity on how this new approach to forestry can be conducted from an operational perspective. This will be possible by looking at productivity numbers which have been recorded and provided graciously by Back Country Farm and Forestry whose cooperation and great work is much appreciated. Having the ability to evaluate additional associated costs and identify required support will be necessary to see these types of treatments conducted successfully. The folks from MFI have organized a field day this Friday where several DLF staff have planned to attend, including the Deputy Minister of Lands and Forestry, Paul Lafleche. These opportunities are a great time for discussion and as I always say - "On the ground in the forest is the best place to talk about forestry".

On the private land side of things, Beaverdam Enterprises should be finishing up planned thinning work on Spence Managed Forest (SMF) in a couple weeks. I met with the SMF folks Thursday, and they were very pleased with the work Beaverdam has been doing and look forward to the final product. When we wrap things up on SMF, we plan to move back into the Pockwock watershed for Westfor to continue the work we have been completing which is part of a carbon study by Dalhousie PhD student David Foster. We are pleased to continue our participation with David as the work he is doing is very interesting as it involves the relationships between forest management, carbon, and water quality.

Lots going on and we will keep you posted.
