### Notes from the Safety Committee

A provincewide burn ban is now in effect in Nova Scotia as soaring temperatures and dry conditions has the Minister of Natural Resources warning that "nobody wants a repeat of the devastation we experienced in 2023". The ban, which carries a \$25,000 fine, was put in place on July 30 and will remain in place until October 15<sup>th</sup> or until conditions improve. We urge everyone to respect and obey this burn ban.

## **Notes from Eacan Timber**

We have had our fair share of warm weather over the past couple of weeks. The ideal spot for most is near water; whether that's a local beach, a nearby pool or a sprinkler in the front yard. I feel Canadians embrace summer more than others as it feels so short.

To say the lumber market is facing uncertain times is an understatement. The long-standing softwood lumber duties are poised to increase over the next few months to a range of between 16.50% to 41.67%. The "Coles Notes" version is the US lumber industry feels Canada has been "dumping" lumber into the USA below production costs. The mills mentioned below all have a different rate depending on their own situations. The "All Others" rate is what is used for every other producer and is an average of the four mills percentages. Luckily, Nova Scotia is exempt from paying these duties which is a blessing.

The other factor facing us today is the potential tariffs imposed by the White House. These tariffs are supposed to hit in August, but the exact percentage and timeline are to be determined. The speculation is 15% tariff imposed at the first of August, but we have seen this one play out before. We will have to wait and see if the goal posts will be moved. There is a strong belief that lumber will be excluded from such tariffs but again we will have to wait to be certain.

In the end, the lumber buyers are confused as they don't know what to do. Tariffs will increase the cost of goods consumed by Americans and household budgets will tighten. This could be a negative effect as lumber consumptions slows. On the other hand, they see price increases coming with increased duties. They are so confused that most have decided to slow purchases and reduce inventory. Doing nothing is their current mindset. Hopefully, there will be clarity in the near future. Until then, enjoy the beautiful summer weather and stay safe.

Earlier this spring, the forestry community in Nova Scotia lost one of its greatest advocates and a true pioneer in sustainable forestry practices in Nova Scotia, Jim Bremner. Jim, who I had the privilege of meeting around 10 years ago, was a long-time silviculture contractor and woodlot manager. Jim first reached out looking for a partnership of sorts to help manage woodlots he was involved with, most notably, the Spence Managed Forest. That sparked a long-standing relationship with Elmsdale Lumber and a true friendship and mentor for me. Jim and I worked on multiple projects throughout the years, and I greatly respected his vision and knowledge. One highlight was the Spence Managed Forest winning the Provincial Woodlot Owner of the Year honors in 2019 - a tribute to the decades of management on the woodlot he provided.

Along with other private woodlots, Jim also managed his own Castle Frederick Farm and the historic property's associated woodlot. Jim's own family woodlot was no exception to the outcomes of Jim's vision for sustainable forestry practices. Having been on the woodlot during multiple silviculture and harvest operations, I can verify it was an explementary example of what a multi-use land base can be. Prior to Jim's passing, the Castle Frederick Farm woodlot was nominated for Woodlot Owner of the Year honor. He was quite excited to have his name thrown in the hat for this award even though his humble nature did not allow for him to have any expectation of winning. Fast forward to now, and the woodlot indeed received the honors of the award. This is a great tribute to a man who spent most of his life dedicated to forestry. His legacy, continued by his daughters, will be felt on the woodlot for years to come and it is wonderful to have the opportunity to celebrate him and his family on this special day coming up this fall.
