Notes from the Safety Committee

Pinch point injuries most commonly involve the fingers and hands. Minor types of pinch point injuries include cuts, bruises, blisters, and contusions. More serious types of pinch point injuries include amputations, lacerations, broken bones, and even death.

Tips to avoid pinch point hazards

Follow these tips to prevent pinch hazards on the job site:

Never place your hands where you can't see them: Always keep your eyes on your hands. If your view is obstructed, do not proceed with the work until you have a clear view of what you are working on.

Pay close attention around moving parts: When using your hands around any machinery or moving parts, always stay vigilant and pay close attention.

Wear proper PPE (Personal protective equipment): Types of (PPE) to protect against pinch points may include safety gloves. You'll also want to wear snug clothing, remove jewelry, and secure long hair back to avoid getting caught or tangled in a pinch point.

Follow Lock Out/Tag Out Procedures: Always make sure equipment is de-energized before starting any repairs or maintenance work.

Avoid shortcuts: Stress the importance of doing the job right rather than taking shortcuts to save time as this can often lead to careless mistakes and costly injuries.

Notes from Woodlands

The spring weight restrictions on designated hauling routes were lifted this past Monday, April 28th. We welcome this, as we are looking to build up our log inventory. Hopefully we continue to see ground conditions dry and woods roads stabilize to support increased deliveries. Again, we thank all our suppliers who work with us on our log supply needs.

I would like to take this opportunity to plug a company who has been gaining some attention for an initiative they have been working on. Dennis Bedford and his partner Tina McAuley have been trying to build brush saw operator capacity through a concept they started developing a couple years ago. Dennis is a former co-owner of Novon Forestry Inc, a large silviculture company he stepped aside from last year. Dennis decided to focus on something he has been passionate about for some time - finding a way to build a sustainable professional silviculture workforce in Nova Scotia. Forming D Bedford Forestry Services with his partner Tina in 2024, they connected with a local high school to recruit students interested in forestry work. The concept was built around a comprehensive training program that was substantial enough in content and duration to allow the students to achieve the necessary skill level to make a decent wage. Pre-commercial thinning along with most silviculture work is paid at a per hectare piece rate. This can create challenges for contractors, as it can be very difficult for new hires to make a living wage while gaining the necessary skills to reach production levels necessary. It is also difficult for many contractors to dedicate their time to training due to the tight margins, and relatively low retention of new hires. Dennis and Tina are trying to develop a training system which can hopefully evolve into a program accessible to all contractors where during an adequate training period the new hires would be guaranteed an hourly wage while getting "up to speed".

Notes from Woodlands, con't

The pilot phase of this initiative supported by the High-Performance Logging program partnered with the Canadian Woodlands Forum was very successful in 2024. The program trial highlighted the financial challenges for contractors most of us suspected, however Dennis and Tina were able to recruit a student workforce that grew as the year progressed and through Dennis's training program met the necessary milestone markers and production increases over time. Dennis and Tina are looking to continue this initiative in 2025 and are working with various funding sources to hopefully acquire support for this important work. Even if Pre-Commercial Thinning is just a temporary job choice for some of these folks, this is a great way to expose the next generation to possible careers in forestry. For now, we need brush saw operators and a stable silviculture work force is necessary for a long-term stable log supply.

Great job Dennis and Tina! We appreciate the work that you are doing.
