Notes from Woodlands

In last month's newsletter I mentioned the good fortune our woodlands operations were experiencing as a very welcomed cold snap allowed us to facilitate harvesting on blocks requiring such cold conditions. I also noted this was likely a short window and we would take full advantage while it lasted. Well, next year I think I will keep my thoughts to myself, as the very next week, we could see the forecast turning to a warmer outlook. In response the Nova Scotia Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal announced the scheduled spring weight restrictions for hauling would come into effect February 28th. This announcement required us to pivot quickly, implementing spring harvest plans much sooner than we would like.

Notes from Woodlands, con't

I have mentioned on a few occasions over the last couple of years the government of Nova Scotia's intention to adopt a new ecological based approach for managing our forests in the province. This new model, which is based on a three-leg system, is designed to achieve a balance, and includes a protected leg, a high production forestry leg, and a light touch forestry ecological matrix leg. It has been widely accepted that for the triad model to be successful, all three legs must be implemented and balanced appropriately. Our province, as far as I understand, is well under way with the protected leg, and earlier this month the Department of Natural Resources and Renewables began steps to phase in the ecological matrix leg of the plan. This means all harvesting on Crown Lands starting this summer will be completed using designated approved prescriptions described in the Nova Scotia Silviculture Guide for the Ecological Matrix or SGEM as it is widely referred.

We are now eagerly awaiting clarification on when the third and final leg of the triad model will begin implementation on the ground. The remaining High Production Forestry (HPF) leg is arguably the most important leg for the forest industry as it will allow for even aged management treatments designed to maximize growth and yield for sawlogs and stud wood. As such, this should provide a sustainable wood supply from Crown Lands, alleviating pressure to achieve such supply from the Ecological Matrix where a "lighter touch" is expected. We hope this much needed component of the triad will be available for application soon, allowing for the balance that was intended from the start. We have embraced and supported the implementation of the triad model if rolled out in its entirety since the concept was introduced to us, and we will continue to support the roll out, hoping we will see all three legs implemented soon.
