## Notes from Woodlands

With the end of 2023 in sight, we are planning our winter operations with the mindset there is no quarantee what we will receive for cold weather. Although we have seen some stretches of winter weather lately, it might indicate things are trending that way, however, our memories are still quite fresh on how last winter went, or better yet didn't really happen. This winter, if possible, we will do our best to accommodate our operations on all-weather roads. The same considerations are also being made regarding log deliveries from our suppliers coinciding with the planned sawmill shut down this January. Although we are currently at stable log inventory levels, we will have to be mindful of slowed deliveries due to unfavourable weather conditions and carefully regulate with the down time of the upgrade. Working closely with our suppliers will be key during this period.

Our silviculture crews are busy finishing up our planned program for 2023. It has been increasingly difficult securing saw operators in the industry, and with an aging workforce this will be a growing concern in the future. With an ongoing review of silviculture systems in the province, there has been an acknowledgment from most for the need to adjust the current structure. Hopefully, with some changes, we can make it more attractive for individuals to enter the much-needed workforce. On a positive note, we are starting to see uptake some with contractors introducing mechanization to their operations.

This is something we have been trying over the last couple years with some success and always with the hope that others will eventually adopt. The concept is not to replace manual saw operators on jobs that are appealing for the workers, rather create an option for the many overgrown, difficult, or missed sites where using the small machines with cutting heads can be a great option where it can be difficult for manual saw operators to make an adequate wage. I think with the proper evolution of this, it has the potential to be a great addition to an existing contractor's operation.

It is currently difficult to support mechanized work under the present system, but again, hopefully we will see the necessary changes soon to support such work and contribute to the sector's progression. That is my Christmas wish this year!
