# Notes from Woodlands

Last month, we reported on the challenges we were facing building up our log inventory. Those challenges continued throughout May and June, and we expect it will require a few months of building before we are entirely comfortable. Conditions in the woods regarding harvesting and trucking have improved somewhat over the last couple of months, and as a result we are seeing a few more loads trickle in. However, with the bit of rain we have experienced lately, trucking has still been a bit of a challenge on some operations as we are very much relying on the continued level of harvesting from our own operations as well as the commitments of our suppliers to keep pace. However, we are heading in the right direction and are confident this will only improve as we roll along throughout the summer.

In 2019, I met Troy Robichaud. Troy was the project coordinator for the Confederacy of Mainland Mi'kmaq (CMM) and was instrumental in the development of their forestry program the Mi'kmaw Forestry Initiative (MFI). Troy and I worked very closely together for the past three years developing operational plans and organizing harvest activities that align with the MFI objectives. Troy is a very capable, natural leader, who possesses exceptional people skills. Although Troy came with a background in environmental science, he had somewhat limited experience regarding forestry operations. He was very upfront about that from the beginning.

Troy's open-minded nature and eagerness to be out in the field allowed for him to quickly learn and we had many productive days running around the woods. Coming from different backgrounds, we often had discussions around the interwoven, complex nature of forestry in Nova Scotia and we both agreed working together to find a balance regarding managing our forests was essential




# Notes from Shelby Molnar's Corner
